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The Joint Oil Data Initiative (JODI)

Why?

- Improve global oil market stability and predictability
- Support sound planning and enhance global energy security

How?

- Enhance international oil market transparency through exchange of oil data at the global level
 - Monthly submission by participating countries of domestic data on oil flows and products
 - Monthly release of collected data to public (oil analysts and others) on a free basis

JODI Data Collection Mechanism

Participating Countries

Countries submit data to their organisation (APEC, Eurostat, IEA, OLADE, OPEC, UNSD)



Partner organisations

Data checking and processing



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Data release on the JODI website

JODI: Improving Oil Market Stability through Oil Data Transparency

Participating countries

JODI organisations

- Data collection from member countries
- Data checking in consultation with member countries

Industry

- As data provider: inquiry on data submission
- As data user: feedback on data quality

Other data users (academia, analysts, journalists)

The JODI training programme: Description (1)

Objective

Promote JODI, share experience on data validation, best practices on data collection issues and improve the quality of oil data reported in JODI

Targeted participants

- > Officials in charge of oil statistics
- Representatives from the oil industry

JODI Training Workshops

- Level: Region. Number of participants: 30-40
- Past Workshops: Latin America (August 2006), Sub-Saharan Africa (January 2007, Middle East and North Africa (October 2007)

JODI Internships

- Level: Country. Number of participants: 2-4
- Past Internships: India, Vietnam (July 2007), Azerbaijan, Myanmar (September 2007)

The JODI training programme: Description (2)

Organisation of Workshops

- Collective selection of participating countries/regions
- Collective effort in organising regional workshops (host country, JODI partner organisations and others)

Presentations material

- Agreement on content by partner organisations
- Presentation material in harmonised format

Benefits

- Improved productivity and optimised use of organisations resources through;
 - Mutualising expertise on energy data issues,
 - Sharing experience of handling training workshops
 - Avoiding duplication of presentations material on issues of common interest

The JODI training programme: Lessons learned from past JODI Training Workshops and conditions for success

- Designate one Coordinator (fine tuning of the agenda, contact with host country, invitation letters to participants, help participants in processing their visa application, etc.)
- Strong commitment of organisations involved is essential
- Assess past training sessions (overall organisation of the workshop, training sessions content, duration, etc.)
- Use assessment results to improve upcoming training sessions
- Ensure follow-up with participants (individuals/countries) in coordination with JODI partner organisations
